

ISEE THE LIGHT

In recent headlines, the world followed the remarkable return of NASA astronauts Sunita Williams and Butch Wilmore, who were stranded in space for an extended period. In June 2024, they embarked on what was initially planned as an eight-day mission to the International Space Station. However, due to technical malfunctions in their spacecraft, they were forced to remain in space for an astonishing 286 days. Living in the uncertainty of whether they would return safely, they were metaphorically in darkness, waiting for the light of hope to break through. Despite the unforeseen challenges, they continued their mission, contributing to scientific experiments and spacewalks. In one of his interviews, Wilmore expressed that his faith in Jesus was a source of strength during this prolonged ordeal. His reliance on faith in such an uncertain time beautifully mirrors the Easter message: light triumphs over darkness.

Life often brings moments of uncertainty and hardship; times when we struggle with worries, challenges and burdens that seem overwhelming. In these moments, darkness can feel overpowering, leaving us searching for hope. Yet, Easter proclaims a resounding truth: darkness does not have the final word, light does.

On Easter night, we witness a profound ritual in the Church. The service begins in darkness until a single flame, the Paschal candle, is lit. From this one flame, every person in the church kindles their candle, and soon the entire church is aglow. It is a powerful reminder that Christ, our light, has risen and conquered the darkness of sin, despair and death. This transformation from darkness to light is not only a beautiful visual experience but also a profound metaphor. Each individual candle may offer only a small amount of light, but together they dispel the darkness

Light is a rich and recurring symbol in Christianity. Scripture begins with God's command, "Let there be light." Jesus, in the Gospel of Matthew, calls His followers "the light of the world". These words were revolutionary to those under Roman rule, not because they signified power or status, but because they spoke of influence, how even the smallest light contributes to a greater whole.

Beyond religious contexts, we instinctively associate light with hope and guidance. We speak of finding the 'bright side' in adversity, searching for the 'light at the end of the tunnel', and admiring those who serve as a 'shining example' to others. In uncertain times, we may feel powerless, much like the people of first-century Palestine, who lived under rigid religious laws. Yet, Jesus taught us that faith is not about rigid rule-following but about living by principles; going beyond duty to do what is right, freely forgiving, and giving without expectation.

To be a light in the world is not about selfpromotion but self-examination. It challenges us to reflect on how we conduct ourselves. Do we offer kindness or bitterness? Joy or despair? Encouragement or discouragement? Thankfulness or ingratitude? Do we build up or tear down? Accept or reject? Light and darkness provide a simple yet potent way to evaluate our choices and actions.

This Easter, as we celebrate the triumph of light over darkness, let us remember that Christ's resurrection is not just a historical event, it is a call to live as people of the light. No matter how small our flame may seem, when we share it through love, kindness, and faith, we brighten the world around us. Let us carry this light beyond the Easter season, illuminating the path for those in need and bearing witness to the hope that never fades.

Christ is risen! Alleluia! May His light fill your hearts with joy and blessings. Wishing you a blessed Easter!

LUMEN FIDEI - THE LIGHT OF FAITH

Easter comes to remind us about the victory of the Light of Faith over the Darkness of Sin. We rejoice in the final triumph of light. Sin and death have no dominance over us. Christ's ultimate sacrifice puts an end to the reign of darkness. Pope Francis' first encyclical, Lumen Fidei, issued in 2013, focuses on how faith is the essential guiding light for our modern day lives. Faith is found within secular society too. It's not just about believing in God. It's explicit even in daily mundane situations. Lumen Fidei seeks to restore the faith that seems lost in our modernity.

In all His passion predictions, Jesus affirmed that He will not only die for our sins but also that He will be raised to life. He kept seeing the glorious light of resurrection in the midst of his dark and gloomy passion. Resurrection connects the past and the future - the bitter truth of the agony of crucifixion, the depth of God's love and the future glory of His second coming. Resurrection therefore becomes the anchor of our faith. Lumen Fidei (LF) 15, says that Christian faith is centred on Christ and confesses Him as Lord and risen from the dead. It goes on to affirm that Christ dying for our sake is a clearest proof of the reliability of God's love. We can believe in this love that didn't recoil from death. This allows us to entrust ourselves to God completely. LF 17 says that Christ's resurrection shows us that He was able to conquer death and make the fullness of life shine forth.

Lumen Fidei also presents before us the ultimate example of Abraham as the Father of Faith. Abraham found himself in the beginning without an heir to him and nearing his end. His reality was such that he was advanced in his

age and scientifically it was impossible for him to have a child, let alone see his generation as the sand of the shore. Only by faith he could see such things happening. However, Abraham was able to see beyond the present reality and hope for a future where he is blessed and in him, his descendants too will be blessed. He kept his faith in God who keeps His promises. What was asked of Abraham was to exhibit a deep faith in God despite his hardships.

As we celebrate the Solemnity of Easter, we too may be going through life situations that might seem threatening. Life around us may not be promising. We might be living in a phase where a sickness may be lingering in our family, a misunderstanding may be blocking our relationships, financial burdens may be weighing us down or our own evil habits may be turning into hurdles for our growth as Children of God. We may be thinking to ourselves that there is no way out. It is the light of faith that will enable us to see beyond all these temporary trials so that we may pass through and rise beyond them. With Jesus on our side, we too will RISE

Happy Easter to everyone.

ISEE THE LIGHT OF FORGIVENESS

Lent is a time of reflection, a time of repentance. It is a time to examine our hearts and strive to live more like Christ through acts of sacrifice while contemplating the profound mercy He offers us. It is through prayers we invite God into our struggles, seek His guidance and open our hearts to transformation. Fasting and prayers turn our hearts towards God while almsgiving turns our hearts towards others. Together these three disciplines prepare us to fully enter into the mystery of Easter.

Repentance and Forgiveness is a cycle. I hated the practice of atonement when I was young, but as I have grown older and have grown in faith, I have found how vital this cycle is for us humans. It is repentance that humbles us sinners and allows the Holy Spirit to pass through our broken hearts and transform our minds. And it is forgiveness that heals the wounds brought by sin. God's forgiveness reunites us to Him; the forgiveness we offer reunites us to each other. This way we are able to encounter Jesus Christ and to embrace the difficult path of the Cross.

Forgiveness plays a crucial role in enhancing our spiritual, emotional, and physical wellbeing. By forgiving others we open the doors to experience God's forgiveness fully and remove any barriers in our relationship with Him. Holding on grudges and bitterness can lead to emotional distress but by forgiving those who have wronged us, we can lead to inner peace and improve mental health. We must also learn to forgive our past, allowing us to concentrate on the present and future. This shift fosters personal growth and a renewed sense of purpose. By embracing forgiveness, we lighten the load of resentment we carry.

There is nothing that God has not already forgiven us for. Most often, we fall into selfpity, dwelling on our flaws, and thinking that God will not forgive us this time, which leads to misery. Do we think we are too distant from God's forgiveness? Isn't it disrespectful for what Jesus died for on the cross? By being miserable, we think we will atone for our sins. However, we need to understand that Jesus has already made atonement on our behalf. What we truly need is to accept God's forgiveness and express our gratitude for His boundless grace.

The Divine Mercy devotion is a modern devotion towards God's infinite mercy. It involves a total commitment to God as Mercy. It is a decision to trust completely in Jesus, to accept His mercy with thanksgiving and to be merciful as He is merciful. The Divine Mercy novena, a nine-day prayer devotion, is prayed beginning on Good Friday which leads us to the feast of the Divine Mercy. Also known as Divine Mercy Sunday, the feast will be celebrated this year on 27th April. The feast is associated with the image of the Divine Mercy, which depicts Jesus with the words "Jesus, I trust in You".

Jesus told Sr. Faustina (Apostle of Divine Mercy) "The greater the sinner, the greater the right he has to My Mercy (Diary 723). He also said, "If someone causes you trouble, think what good you can do for the person who caused you to suffer" (Diary 1760). We not only need to forgive, but according to Jesus, we should do good to that person. It is tough, but God will grant us the graces we need to see the light. Flavia Dsouza

I SEE THE LIGHT OF PRAYER

"The Lord is near to all who call on Him, to all who call on Him in truth." (Psalm 145:18)

Prayer, God's gift to us, is a guiding light and a steadfast anchor that carries us through the darkest storms. It is through prayer that we experience His presence, peace, and power.

In my own life, I have seen firsthand the miraculous impact of prayer. At the age of eleven, I was diagnosed with Guillain-Barré Syndrome (GBS), a rare condition for which doctors gave little hope of a quick recovery. I was partially paralyzed, unable to walk, and had to relearn how to use my limbs like a child. The road to recovery seemed daunting and painful. Yet, even in that moment of despair, something extraordinary happened. Church members, whom I have never met, began to pray for me. Their collective prayers became a source of strength for my parents and me, reassuring us that we were not alone. "The prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective" (James 5:16). It was through the power of communal prayer that I found healing, reaffirming my faith that God moves when His people intercede for one another.

Prayer is also a source of endurance and hope in everyday struggles. Years later, I found myself in another trial. Working in a bank, I faced a toxic work environment where office politics cost me my job. Losing that position left me in self-doubt. For two months, I searched desperately for new opportunities, but doors remained shut. It was during this time that individual prayer became my refuge. Every night, I poured out my anxieties before the Lord, trusting in His plan even when I could not see it. "Cast all your anxiety on Him because

He cares for you" (1 Peter 5:7). My personal prayers, along with the support of my prayer group and church community, strengthened me. And in His perfect timing, God opened a door to a job that was far better than what I had lost. Looking back, I see that prayer was the light that guided me through that season of waiting.

Prayer is not just about receiving answers; it is about drawing closer to God. It shifts our focus from our problems to His power, from our fears to His faithfulness. As a member of the Music Ministry, I have witnessed how prayer and worship intertwine, lifting our spirits and drawing us into God's presence. There have been moments during prayer meetings when the presence of God was so tangible, it felt as though heaven itself had touched earth.

No matter what season of life we are in, the light of prayer is always available to us. It is the candle that never goes out. If you are struggling, do not lose hope. Kneel, pray, and trust. "Then you will call on me and come and pray to me, and I will listen to you" (Jeremiah 29:12). The light will shine again.

In the youth group, I strengthened my creativity and adaptability.

Through these roles, I understood that confidence isn't about being fearless, it's about stepping forward despite fear. I reminded myself: God does not call the qualified; He qualifies the called.

The more I got involved, the more I felt drawn to build myself. I took a bold step and joined the CLAYM (Certificate for Leadership Acumen in Youth Ministry) leadership course by DYC, where I am learning to lead with faith and serve with humility.

Today, I look back at my journey with gratitude. I now see the light within me, it pushes me to grow, serve, and embrace new challenges. It reminds me that I have a purpose and that I am enough.

Every year, Sunday School organises social outreach programs for each standard. The purpose of these outreach programs is to give us children the experience of putting our faith into practice. The curriculum is not restricted to only a one-hour class on Sunday, but we are motivated to reach out and practice the values of Christ.

This year for our Social Outreach program, Std 9 decided to make grocery hampers consisting of dal, rice, sugar, soaps and biscuits and distribute them to the migrant families living in the pipeline area behind Vijay Nagar. We were encouraged to save our pocket money and buy the grocery items from our savings so that we can learn the virtue of sacrifice, humility and sharing. With our contributions and supported by the Novena social outreach collection we were able to make 31 grocery hampers. It felt nice that we children were able to personally contribute to this outreach. On 26th January, 11 of us students, 4 catechists and one representative from the SVP, who guided us through that area, headed to visit the families and distribute the hampers.

During our short visit from 10:30am to 12 noon, we learnt a little about the people who live there. These families came to Mumbai for a better lifestyle, more job opportunities, education and medical facilities but due to low income they cannot afford to rent a flat and hence live in temporary constructed houses or slums. They cannot even provide food for their families. When we handed them the grocery hampers, we could see the spark of light in their eyes and smiles on their faces. By this

activity, they witnessed that there are still people in this world who spread light in others life. I was grateful to be one with them. I felt blessed by helping them with whatever I could give. There were many small children running around, we gave each one of them a chocolate. The smile they gave us when we gave them the chocolate enlightened my eyes, like a hope that this world can be a better place.

The purpose of this outreach was to do an act of service by spreading the light of Christ. When I left from that place, I learnt many values like kindness, humility and humanity. I also learnt that we should be grateful to God for all that He gives us and that we should share the things we have with the people around us. The other standards of Sunday school also completed their social outreach activities, and they visited the Home for the Aged, Sneha Sadan, Angels Nest, Balwadi and house helps who work in our homes. I am sure that every student who participated was enriched by their experience.

This experience for me was very meaningful and beautiful. I promise that I will continue to be of service to mankind in whatever way I can through such Social Outreach Programmes in Sunday school and also as an adult.

Whether through soulful melodies, uplifting rhythms, or powerful lyrics, music connects deeply with the heart, guiding individuals toward healing, self-discovery and renewed purpose.

What Happens Without a Will?

- Your assets are distributed per succession laws, which may not reflect your wishes.
- Courts decide guardianship for minor children.

SEEING THE LIGHT AFTER LOSS

A letter to my wife - through life loss and the love that teaches us to cherish every moment.

We always shared the comfort of sending each other letters, pouring our deepest feelings onto paper; the kind of truths too delicate to be spoken aloud. Each letter was a quiet promise, a reflection of the bond we cherished. But never did I imagine I would have to write her a letter she would never read. That my words, once meant to reach her hands, would instead drift into the silence she left behind. The ink on this page feels heavy, for it carries the weight of a love that still lingers, aching for a reply that will never come.

This is a personal account of how the sudden loss of a loved one tears through life like a storm, leaving behind only fragments of what once was. She was young, full of life, vibrant with dreams until fate delivered a cruel. unimaginable blow. The diagnosis came like a death sentence: metastasized spine bone cancer. A condition so rare, so merciless, that it offered no cure, only suffering. In a heartbeat, joy turned to anguish, certainty to chaos and the future we had envisioned crumbled before our eyes. She left behind a long list of dreams that would never be fulfilled, plans that would never unfold, a life unfinished.

The first signs were pain; deep, unrelenting pain that refused to be ignored. Then came the slow, merciless betrayal of her own body. She lost the ability to sit, to stand, to walk. The bed became her world, and she, a prisoner within it. Once independent and full of grace, she now depended on others for even the simplest of tasks. And yet, through it all, she bore her suffering with silent strength, her spirit fighting against the inevitable, her heart refusing to let go.

It was only when we looked back that we realised how much more we could have done; how blind we had been to the depth of her pain, how little we truly understood what it meant for her to know that time was slipping away. She must have wanted so much more - more moments, more memories, more love shared. But she carried her grief alone, behind a smile that masked her fears. We whispered reassurances, telling her we were praying, that heaven itself was being stormed for a miracle. But what she longed for was not just words - she longed for a sign, for a reason to believe that hope was not slipping through her fingers.

We told her, "God will heal you. You will walk out of this pain." But what did we know of God's plan? What did we understand of the suffering He allowed? Perhaps, in our desperate hope, we failed to see the silent surrender in her eyes, the quiet acceptance of a destiny none of us were ready to face.

Her body may have weakened, but her love never did. Now, in the emptiness she left behind, we realise the weight of every unspoken word, every unexpressed gratitude, every moment we thought we had more time for.

Life is fragile, fleeting. We take for granted the people who shape us, who silently sacrifice for us, who love us beyond words. And then, one day, they are gone. And we are left with memories - memories of laughter,

of arguments, of ordinary moments that suddenly feel sacred.

We do not know why God allows suffering. But perhaps, in the deepest pain, there is a path to something greater - a love that transcends, a light that never fades. And maybe, just maybe, she was never really leaving. Perhaps she was simply seeing the light before we could.

And now, I know that I too, must learn to see the light. Not just in extraordinary moments, but in the mundane - in the warmth of the

morning sun, in the laughter of our children, in the kindness of a stranger, in the quiet presence of those who love me. If her journey has taught me anything, it is this: the light is always there, even in the midst of darkness. Someday, I will see the light beside her once more. But until then, I will strive to see it, to embrace it, and to share it - with our children, with our loved ones, and with the world around me. I will take the chances I once feared, knowing that life is too fleeting to wait for the perfect moment. Because the light is not just ahead of me - it is here, now, in every breath, in every heartbeat, in every act of love.

As the workshop concluded, participants expressed their appreciation for the ministry and their eagerness to put their new skills into practice. Feedback highlights that the experience not only honed their technical abilities but also enriched their spiritual lives.

We would like to extend our heartfelt gratitude to Joel Furtado for leading this workshop, as well as to all the participants whose commitment to grow in faith and serve our parish is truly inspiring.

1. During the Easter Vigil, why do we light the Paschal Candle and what does it signify?

The Paschal Candle is one of the most important symbols in the Catholic Church, especially during the Easter Vigil. You must have noticed that the Easter Vigil begins in darkness to represent the world before Jesus rose from the dead. Then, a new fire is blessed, and the Paschal Candle is lit from it. This symbolizes Jesus bringing light, hope, and new life. Just as light removes darkness, The priest carves certain symbols on the Paschal Candle during this rite.

- A cross Representing Jesus' sacrifice and victory over death.
- Alpha (A) and Omega (Ω) The first and last letters of the Greek alphabet, showing that Jesus is eternal, the beginning and the end.
- The current year A reminder that Jesus is alive and present today.
- Five grains of incense Representing the five wounds of Jesus from His crucifixion (hands, feet, and side).

Once the Paschal candle is lit, its flame is shared with smaller candles held by the congregation. As the church fills with light, it symbolizes that Jesus, the Light of the World, has overcome darkness. The Paschal Candle is a powerful sign of Jesus' resurrection and his victory over death & darkness. This Easter as you light your candle from the flame of the Pascal candle, let it remind you of Jesus' everlasting presence in your life.

2. I keep seeing the terms IHS and INRI but I don't really know what they mean. Can you throw some light on it?

Surely. You may have seen the letters IHS and INRI in churches, on crucifixes, on the Host and even on priests' robes. These letters are abbreviations in Latin and Greek that carry important meanings IHS – A Short Form for Jesus' Name.

- IHS comes from the first three letters of Jesus' name in Greek: $IH\Sigma OY\Sigma$ (Iēsous).
- Over time, it became a common symbol for Jesus Christ.
- Some also believe IHS stands for "Iesus Hominum Salvator," which is Latin for "Jesus, Savior of Men."

INRI – The Words on Jesus' Cross

INRI stands for "Iesus Nazarenus, Rex Iudaeorum," which means "Jesus of Nazareth, King of the Jews" in Latin. These words were written on a board and placed above Jesus' head when He was crucified. Pontius Pilate ordered the sign to be written in Hebrew, Greek, and Latin so everyone could understand it. Jewish leaders didn't like this title because they did not accept Jesus as their king, but Pilate refused to change it.

The Paschal Candle, IHS and INRI remind us of Jesus' sacrifice, victory over death, and His everlasting presence. These symbols are powerful ways to remember His undying love.
